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A Word from the Coach

Two years ago, Naomi walked into the gym wearing tight sweat-pants and a t-shirt that did not quite meet her pants. She was preoccupied

with flipping her waist length hair and not at all concerned with getting in the circle to warm up and stretch for volleyball. She was in sixth grade with the look and the attitude of a much older teenager.

In Naomi's self-centered adolescent world, she was focused on the school gossip and how she could impose herself in every situation that came her way. During homework help, she would be off visiting every nearby table so she could stir the pot of drama before being told to sit down and take out her homework. Naomi was unable to think about the consequences of not completing her assignments or not following the rules in the after-school program. When she was told she would not be able to participate in volleyball if she did not wear appropriate clothing, it seemed as if the words went in one ear and out the other. The eagerness to participate in Jeremy's Heroes after-school program was clearly not a love of sports or service. She was not looking to improve her grades by utilizing the extra help available to her during homework help. Naomi was there because she wanted to socialize.

Not a week went by, that Naomi was not reminded or warned to wear the right clothes to JH Extra Innings, stay out of others peoples problems, not to overreact to minor incidents, focus on what she was doing at the moment and not on what others were doing, and finally, that her actions would have consequences. Sound familiar? Naomi was a typical middle school student. She had no concept that there was anything else around her except her own present egocentric "Naomi World". To make matters worse, unless she broke a two generation history of teen pregnancy and single parenthood, her own vision of her future was not bright.

If Jeremy's Heroes Extra Innings program could change the path of Naomi's future, then our program is indispensable. Can a sports and service program

with a little time for extra school work help change a child's outlook for her future?

Three months into this year's JH Extra Innings program at Naomi's school, the teachers, coaches and I were discussing which 10 out of 75 children would be selected to go to a Knicks preseason game at Madison Square Garden. Our criteria was: perfect attendance, no detentions, being on time for school, no missing homework or failing grades, and displaying leadership qualities during sports and service activities. When we finalized the list, and reviewed the children who had earned this reward, I was elated to see Naomi's name was at the top!

Last week, I was working with the girls doing their community service. A teacher asked if we would decorate the hallway bulletin boards with his students' reports and projects. Naomi was working next to me, cheerfully chatting away about what high schools she was thinking about attending next year. She said no one in her family left the neighborhood for high school, but there were a lot of schools she was interested in attending. Two of the other eighth grade girls were talking about the neighborhood high school and that most of their friends would be going there. It soon became clear that they were trying to make Naomi feel left out for considering any other high school. I turned to Naomi and said I thought the high school search was an exciting chance to meet new people. One of the girls was only too happy to point out that the boy that Naomi liked would be going to school with her, and not Naomi. A comment like this two years ago, was sure to raise Naomi's ire

and demand a quick response. Instead, Naomi turned to me and said "I don't have time to get involved in this drama." She walked back into the classroom and found some other girls to talk to while she worked on cutting out decorations for the board.

Now it is time to answer my question. YES! Jeremy's Heroes sports and service program with a little time for extra school work *does* help change a child's outlook for their future! The attention that Naomi received, the skills and compassion she learned while participating in our sports and service programs, the time that Naomi spent in after-school structured programming instead of hanging out with nothing to do at dismissal time, the constant reminder to think about the consequences of her actions, it all played a role in Naomi's outlook for her future. This typical egocentric middle schooler, with the odds stacked against her, had a support system that helped her understand that she had a future and that she could control that future.

Naomi is not alone! We work with hundreds of kids just like her. As the economy struggles, we know that you want to insure that your donation dollars really have an impact. Jay Williams Joins JH Team!



It is difficult to convey the excitement and community building both teams experience from this competition. At P.S. 108, the children set up a snack shack with the proceeds going to purchase mosquito nets to help combat malaria in Kenya. Teachers stayed until after 5:30 to support the kids, parents came to watch their children. Many students supported their school and there were cheers for the "HEROES" singing throughout the gym.

What should be commonplace, a child's team having a game, is not for many of these children. The referee was a wonderful teacher for the children. The boys on both teams were courteous, complimentary and generous. The parents and guardians followed the children's lead and were enthusiastic for their team but also very kind to their opponents.
